This session the students will learn what it takes to have a winter garden.

#### Lesson 1: Understanding California's Winter Climate Zones

**Objective:** Identify your local USDA Plant Hardiness Zone and microclimate.

- Topics:
  - California's major climate regions (Coastal, Inland, Central Valley, Desert, Mountain)
  - How winter affects each region differently
  - Using zone maps and frost dates
  - Microclimates (urban heat islands, shaded areas, wind pockets)

Activity: Use the USDA Zone Map to find your zone and first/last frost dates.

## Lesson 2: Soil Preparation and Fertility

**Objective:** Build and maintain fertile soil for cool-season crops.

- Topics:
  - Amending with compost and organic matter
  - Cover cropping and green manure
  - Mulching to retain moisture and regulate temperature
  - Avoiding compacted soil during wetter months

**Activity:** Test your soil or create your own compost mix.

#### Lesson 3: What to Plant for flowers and vegetables for a Winter Garden

**Objective:** Select vegetables, herbs, and flowers that thrive in California winters.

- Topics:
  - Top winter crops: kale, broccoli, cabbage, spinach, peas, carrots, radishes, garlic, onions
  - Hardy herbs: cilantro, parsley, thyme, rosemary
  - o Cold-tolerant flowers: pansies, violas, calendula

**Activity:** Make a planting calendar based on your zone and desired crops.

# **¥** Lesson 4: Seed Starting and Transplanting Techniques

**Objective:** Learn when and how to start seeds or transplant winter crops.

- Topics:
  - Direct sowing vs. indoor seed starting
  - Using cold frames, cloches, or greenhouses
  - Transplanting tips for tender seedlings
  - Timing for staggered planting
  - o bulbs

**Activity:** Start seeds indoors and sow a cold-hardy crop directly outdoors.

## Lesson 5: Watering and Frost Protection

**Objective:** Manage moisture and protect crops from cold snaps.

- Topics:
  - Adjusting irrigation in cooler months (less evaporation, more rain)
  - o Drip irrigation vs. hand watering
  - o Frost protection: row covers, garden fabric, mulch, cold frames
  - Recognizing frost damage

**Activity:** Install row covers or mulch a planting area for protection.

## **Lesson 6: Pruning and Dormancy in Winter Gardening**

**Objective:** Define Dormancy and the purpose of pruning and identify what plants we have and what they need.

- Topics
  - Understand what dormancy means in plants and why it happens in winter
  - Explain the purpose of pruning in the fall/winter
  - o Identify the 3 D's: Dead, Diseased, and Damaged branches
  - Practice safe and proper pruning techniques

### **≰Lesson 7: Pest and Disease Management in Winter**

**Objective:** Identify and control common winter pests and diseases.

- Topics:
  - Common winter pests: aphids, snails/slugs, cabbage worms
  - Fungal issues from excess moisture
  - Companion planting for pest deterrence
  - Organic treatment methods (Neem, diatomaceous earth, traps)

Activity: Set up a simple natural pest control system.

#### **≰Lesson 8: Harvesting and Succession Planting**

**Objective:** Harvest winter crops correctly and keep your garden producing.

- Topics:
  - o Signs of readiness for harvest (leafy greens vs. root crops)
  - o Continuous planting (succession planting for winter & early spring)
  - Storing harvested produce
  - o Preparing for transition to spring planting

**Activity:** Harvest one crop and plant another in its place.
